Two devastating earthquakes

On the 6th of February, at 4:17 AM a devastating 7.8 earthquake hit Southern Turkey. This earthquake has affected the following cities: Kilis, Osmaniye, Gaziantep, Malatya, Diyarbakir, Adana and Hatay. After the 7.8 earthquake, a 7.5 magnitude hit again that caused further damages.

The Turkey-Syrian death toll continues to grow currently up to 51,000 and also leaving 108,000 injured. People in Nurdagi a Turkisch town close to the epicentre of the earthquake are currently without homes sheltering in tents provided by the relief community with water and heat. This type of life is predicted to not only go on for weeks but months and possibly years.

Turkey is known for a diverse set of both oriental and European elements.

From traditional Turkish tea to the majestic Hagia Sophia. More than 160,000 Turkish buildings collapsed during the earthquakes, one of them being the historical Gaziantep Castle.

German aid for Turkey

Germany has provided aid worth 6.9 million euros for Turkish and 1.5 for Syrian earthquake zones. "They did everything possible to save lives and rescue those buried beneath the rubble," said Federal Minister of Interior. But this is not the end of the German post-earthquake aid.

The German people with its background linking Turkey and Syria have lead the effort to support and help in this time of tragedy for these countries.

Germany wants to temporarily ease visa restrictions for survivors of the earthquake in Turkey and Syria who have close family ties to Germany if they are facing homelessness or were injured.

Although they are easing visa restrictions applicants must still provide a valid passport in order to be allowed into the country.

However, applicants must be able to provide enough money to pay for the family members. Other than that, they must either agree or deny if the family member is welcome to stay in their home or not.

Many people in Germany have Turkish roots because, more than 60 years ago, Germany recruited "guest workers" from Turkey to advance economically.

eTwinning is a collaborative platform created by the European Commission which enables schools from the European Union to organise, join, run and develop projects on various topics.
